INAUGURAL MESSAGE (September 9, 2021)




The department engaged new students through a virtual Student Induction Program (online) as soon as they united the department; the government has yet to announce the start of regular classes. Our Secretary and Principal, Rev.Dr.Sr.Mary Gilda, presented an inauguration speech to our department's new arrivals (I B.Sc) on September 9, 2021, to discuss the complete process by which the new entrants acclimatise to their new tasks and environment. To put it another way, it was a well-organized event aimed at educating newcomers about the environment and connecting them with others.The new entrantswere informed about the institutional policies, processes, practises, culture, and values at the outset of the induction, and their mentor groups were formed.


To get out of this lockdown situation, a multi-pronged approach is required. The department had to work closely with the newly enrolled students to make them feel at ease, to allow them to explore their academic interests and activities, to reduce competition and encourage them to strive for excellence, to promote student bonding, to build teacher-student relationships, to provide a broader perspective of life, and to develop character. When new students enter a college, they bring a wide range of ideas, backgrounds, and preparations with them. They are entering an unknown environment, and many of them are not familiar with our institution. To make ease at home, our principal had conversation with the students. Approximately 46students from the I B.Sc, (FDAM) programme attended the session.

EDUCATIONAL GUIDANCE & COUNSELLING FOR STUDENTS (September 10, 2021)

Guidance and counseling is the process, which helps the students to know their skills, interests, personality that will help students in further career selection. Guidance is the process in which person able to know their ability, interest, a capacity that will help in the encounter of problems faced by them and is the process of a dynamic interpersonal relationship that is prepared to influence the person's attitude and follow-up behavior. Counseling is the sharing of thoughts, reciprocal logic and guidance between groups or two. Therefore, now the question is how guidance and counseling are related to college going students.

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Ms.N.Meenakshi, Ms.V.Aarthi, and Ms.M. M. Subasri, Assistant Professors of the department, provided a detailed lecture on Educational guidance and counseling to all the department studentson September 10, 2021.

Students are very focused on their academic success, according to Ms.N.Meenakshi, but they never evaluate themselves because they have not investigated colleges. Rather than analyzing themselves, they chose/planned their vocation based on the expertise of others. She barbed out that it is obvious that if I am a Fashion Designer, definitely I will suggest for designing because I have expertise in this field only. Same is applicable for Doctor, Lawyer, designer etc. Here, students made mistakes during the selection of streams and career. Due to this reason, self-assessment is very important, she added.

The earlier trend was not quite often, because there were the limited scope and limited options but in recent days, scope and career options are quite broad that cannot be explored easily, then the trend of self-assessment came into existence and treated as very important. By selfassessment, students can be able to know about their interest area, abilities, personalities, analytical level, and suited work styles. These factors play a significant role in stream and career selection.

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She also remarked that in today's world, most students feel depressed as a result of a professional decision. The simple and straightforward cause is a lack of awareness of current trends and advances, as well as available streams, and an inability to recognize oneself. She noted that she has noticed firsthand that students who excel in academics may be class leaders, but when it comes to making career decisions, they frequently make the wrong choices.

Students will be able to learn more about themselves and more easily deal with the challenges they confront in everyday life with the help of advice and counselling. As a result, guidance and counselling have emerged, and the trend is growing by the day. Ms.V.Aarthi stated that the counselors/experts have extensive knowledge of current trends and developments, available streams, and aspects that have a significant impact on professional decision-making/planning.

This, according to Ms.M. M. Subasri, is critical for a bright and successful future. Identification of interests, abilities, and personality traits will assist students in recognizing their strengths and identifying their strong zones, which will make it easier to enhance their skills. It has been scientifically established that those who are strong in a particular area have a strong desire to learn more about that profession and find it easier to establish a career in that industry. She concluded that, given the present trend, college students need advice and counselling to identify their strengths and weaknesses, as well as work on their strengths and areas of interest, in order to achieve great things in the future. Totally, the programme benefited 45 students.

INTRODUCTION TO FASHION (September10, 2021)

Ms.V.Aarthi gave a talk to all of the department's first-year students on September 10, 2021, titl i "Introduction to Fashion." She began the session by discussing Charles Frederick Worth (13 October 1825 – 10 March 1895), an English Fashion Designer who founded the House of Worth, one of the mist prestigious fashion houses of the nineteenth and early twentieth century.

She went on to say that, fashion designers might make clothing in a variety of ways, including sketching or drawing a pattern on paper to make a basic prototype. Some designers may prefer to drape fabric over an existing dress form. The pattern creator, on the other hand, must be meticulous in the production of the garment. The phrase 'design concept' is occasionally used interchangeably with the terms 'inspiration or 'starting idea' by fashion designers. In the domain of apparel design, a 'design concept' is the depiction of a designer's abstract notions of ultimate entities, such as garments.

She also went into detail regarding fashion. The silhouette, detailing, texture, and colour are all important elements. The overall form, shape, or contour of a costume garment is referred to as silhouette. In addition, she highlighted the eight elements of design. All visual designs are composed of eight elements (Point, Line, Shape, Form, Tone, Texture, Color, and/or Text). These elements are combined and arranged to create a desired visual appearance.

She spoke about the goals of a fashion designer, stating that successful designers prioritize predicting consumer trends in their work. Designers research current consumer trends to determine which demographics are most likely to buy their apparel. She included examples such as how some designers focus on teen girls while others focus on business professionals, as well as the seven steps in the Professional Design Process: Study the Client Brief, Research, Research, Research, Brainstorm, Sketch, Concept Development, Revisions, and Completion. In total, 45 students attended the talk and benefited from it.

WEBINAR ON SUSTAINABLE BUSINESS MODELS IN FASHION(10,September 2021

Sustainable fashion (also known as eco-fashion) is a movement and a process that aims t improve the ecological integrity and social justice of fashion goods and the fashion sector Fashion textiles and products are only one aspect of a sustainable fashion strategy.

The most common definition of sustainability is meeting current needs without jeopardising future generations' ability to meet their own. It is built on three pillars: economic, environmental and social factors.

Sustainable business models allow social entrepreneurs to create social value and maximise social profit; of particular importance is the business models' potential to operate as a market device, assisting in the creation and expansion of markets for socially beneficial inventions.

On July 26, 2021, the Department of FDAM hosted a Virtual Webinar on Sustainable Business Models in Fashion for I B.Sc, II B.Sc and III B.Sc students of our department to raise awareness among the younger youths in order to emphasise the importance of sustainable fashion in order to preserve water and minimise pollution. The event began with the guest speaker being introduced by Ms. N.Meenakshi, Assistant Professor of the department.


Following that, Rev.Dr.Sr.Mary Gilda, Secretary & Principal, introduced the chief guest. The discussion was chaired by Dr.S. Jayapriya, Assistant Professor, Department of Costume Design and Fashion. She concentrated on the three R's: Reduce, Reuse, and Recycle. How can we limit the amount of clothing we reuse and recycle? How can the fashion business reduce waste? -she stated in steps. She also provided ideas for the 3Rs: How to look attractive while not harming the environment.

These firms' production materials and fabrics, such as linen, hemp, and organic cotton, are either natural, renewable, or recycled materials that require little to no water during the manufacturing process. She also remarked that the rise of fast fashion has decreased the life cycle of our clothing. Naturally, customers are more eager to get rid of lower-cost things than higher-cost items. Clothing's quality and value deteriorate as it grows cheaper and cheaper. These two variables have contributed to a 40 percent increase in textile waste between 1999 and 2009.

Clothing should never end up in landfills, but recycling clothing should be considered a last alternative for the environmentally aware customer. Our apparel should be reduced, reworm, and repurposed. Then, once everything else has failed and our clothes have lived a long and happy life, recycle them. Reduce, Rewear, Reshape, and Recycle were the 4Rs that the speaker reconditioned. And she ended up giving the following advice to the attendees of the event: "Every clothing item has a lifespan." You can ensure that your closet has a long life if you are a savvy customer.

Reduce your purchases to only those you know you will like, rewear your clothes with care and inventiveness, and repurpose items to extend its life. You will be saying goodbye to a well-loved friend, not a rapid fashion trend, by the time you reach the recycling stage.

The department's students contributed well with the speaker and asked for clarification on a number of points. The students provided positive feedback on the session. Ms.V.Aarthi, Assistant Professor of the department, proposed a vote of gratitude at the end of the event. The webinar benefited 104 participants.







SOFT SKILLS REQUIRED FOR FASHION DESIGNING (September 11 & 10, 2021 This class began with an overview of soft skills in the institution and current workplace. She emphasized the importance of soft g in enabling us to have meaningful connections with others. Because most careers teamwork, it is critical to have soft skills in order to improve employability and obtain a stude dream job, particularly for Fashion Designers. It would assist us in increasing our can productivity, developing professional relationships, and thriving in our jobs. Today's employ seek candidates who can perform their jobs well but who can also fit into the company cult and interact with other employees. In order to do these things successfully, students need develop soft skills.

She focussed on how to develop soft skills and she advised that they could also kee practicing the following habits to enhance them. She gave tips for the students in relation to fe excerpts were : Aim to be heard- To communicate effectively, it is essential that they are mindful of the other person's wishes and sensibilities, Make eye contact during face-to-face interactions Monitor your body language and observe others. She also added that the students must be ver conscious of their body language when they interact with others. Practice public speaking: If student feel uncomfortable with public interactions, try speaking in front of a mirror. With practice, their speech would flow more naturally. Work on your listening skills: Being a good listener to be a good communicator. She explained that she must be aware of the urge to interrupt someone when they were talking. Always let the other person finish before putting her point across. Improve your written communication: Anything she writes should be clear and concise and made the reader understand her point of view. A total of no. of 82 participants existed in the

INTRODUCTION TO TEXTILES (September 11 & 12, 2021)

Many questions would have been on the minds of students and their parents as part of the introduction programme. Ms.M. Subasri, Assistant Professor, Department of FDAM, explained why students need to know. What is textile research? To the I B.Sc (FDAM) students, every fashion designing student must know about Basic Textile Terms such as Fibre and Yarn. She explained the significance of textile-related research. Textiles are utilised to insulate our homes from the heat and cold. The furniture we sit and sleep on is made up of a variety of textile goods. Roofing materials, wire covers, wall coverings, blinds, air ducts, and window screens all use textiles. She clearly explained that how it connects to fashion. There is no fashion without fabrics. Fashion is a dynamic worldwide sector that plays an essential part in the economic, political, cultural, and social lives of an international audience, thus students should be aware of it. It is a significant aspect of material and visual culture, spanning high art and popular culture. Furthermore, she explained why the textile business is so crucial to our country. She went on to say that the textile industry plays an important part in the Indian economy, employing an estimated 35 million people directly, contributing 4% of GDP, and accounting for 35% of gross export revenues. The textile sector contributes 14 per cent of the value-addition in the manufacturing sector. In total,46 no. of partakers took part in the awareness program.

GLASS PAINTING (September 11, 2021)

Though various glass-painting techniques have appeared throughout the centuries, the ma of them are just minor modifications on traditions that date back to the Middle Ages. painting was demonstrated to the I B.Sc (FDAM) students by the department. Mrs. Jennife lab's Skilled Assistant, demonstrated glass painting. She offered an overview of glass pain stating that it was one of the first ways for creating beautiful glass artworks, and that sta glass, for example, is still used today. The technique entailed colouring the glass.

With the development of glass paint that could be applied to the artwork, this media technique was broadened, allowing for the addition of details to the colourful base. The came in a variety of black and brown tints, with the shade varying depending on the amount type of oxide employed in their production. Ordinary art brushes were used to add delic details, but mediaeval artists sometimes employed sticks and quills to smear the lines a produce a rougher look. This glass staining technique is still in use today, but it has undergo some changes. Still replaces lead, and colours are available in more than two hues. I demonstrator explained that enamels may be placed in layers and fired multiple times, giving artist more control over the colours, making them less see-through, smeared, and brilliant i more complicated designs. The session was attended by 43students from the I B.Sc, (FDA) programme.



MOTIVATIONAL TRAINING (September 12, 2021)

Motivation is a central part of a student's educational experience from precollege onward, but it is has received scant attention amid an education reform agenda focused mainly on accountability, standards and tests, teacher quality, and college management. Education reform could benefit from a robust conversation about the overlooked element of student motivation. Almost everyone knows someone who overcame early hardships to achieve an impressive level of success in college and later life. Most of us also know young people with great early promise who were lackadaisical students and floundered after leaving college. Often the crucial factor that accounts for cases like these is the students' own motivation to learn.

Mr.Kalyan, a Motivational Trainer and guest speaker of the day's session. She initiated with motivational training that focused on self-motivation strategies based on a set of excellent norms. Employees are able to push themselves and achieve personal goals as a result of this. She emphasised the need of pupils developing their own motivation, and she offered several suggestions. Incorporate training into the culture of the company. Keep it interesting by providing regular feedback. Make your subject instruction meaningful to the individual by contextualising it. Recognize their skills while identifying their strengths and emphasising their long-term future prospects.She mentioned that these are the eight ways to motivate ourselves. She also suggested that Simple Ways to Increase Motivation in the Workplace such as Recognize great work, Set small, measurable goals, Celebrate results, Stay positive, Stay fueled, Take regular breaks, and Stay healthy and so on. Eleven students were interacted with the speaker. Totally, 102students form I, II and III B.Sc (FDAM) successfully attended and benefitted by the lecture.

INSPIRING DESIGNERS IN THE INDUSTRY (September12 &11, 2021) Where Do Fashion Designers Find Sources for Inspiration? Ms.V.Aarthi, Assistant Profess where Do results in all fun and the department started her lecture with the question. Next, of course, she mentioned Architecture-some architectural sights so elegant that they could easily inspire a few items of clothes or at least a combination of cold No, it is not about haute couture collections that are designed for advertising purposes on Architecture is a noble art and it sometimes offers elegant lines and airy silhouettes that area for catwalks. She promoted the students that the point is, sources of inspiration are usually around you, and fashion designers know it well. She told the students to note that next time the see an impressive collection, try guessing what inspired the designer. She betted them, it would be something from the list above, she clinched. Totally, 80 students form I B.Sc and B.Sc(FDAM) successfully attended and benefitted by the lecture.

SCOPE OF FASHION DESIGNING (9 and 13 September)

The Indian fashion industry is estimated to be around 108 billion dollars and is expected to grow 2X by next year and to be estimated to be around 223 billion dollars. It is also an encouraging factor that consumers spend around 6% of their incomes on apparel. As a professional fashion designer, you can work in areas like designer wear production, fashion marketing, planning and concept management. Then there is fashion media, design production management, fashion accessory design, quality control and promotion of brands. Fashion designing is one of the extremely lucrative and glamorous career option and opens a world of opportunities for anyone with a passion in this field. Today one may choose to specialize in any one of the sub-fields of fashion such as Apparel designing, Jewellers designing, Accessory designing. The options are limitless! The job of a fashion designer is very demanding which involves meeting daily deadlines, travelling dusty roads to reach the local markets for procuring material, dealing with workers and managing a team effectively. Talented people in this domain enjoy glamour, success & high compensation.

Ms.N.Meenakshi, Assistant Professor of the department commenced her introductory lecture with this outline for I B.Sc and II B.Sc (FDAM) students. However, the present II B.Sc students might not also be aware of the job opportunities available for them due to lockdown. This pandemic period made staff and students to interact with through online. That was a negative feedback from both of us. In order to furnish the details on scope of fashion designing, the department was conducted this induction for all the students of our department. She advised the students, if you want to pursue a career in this industry, you would have to work harder and develop several other skills. It is not only about getting a Bachelor's degree in Fashion Design but also acquire knowledge about Visual Arts, General Design and even Graphic Design.Garment and textile export houses, Textile and fabric manufacturing units,Brander fashion showrooms, Television and Film Industry, Boutiques, Retail Chains, Independent, self employed fashion designers, Teaching in an institute that offers courses in fashion designing Retail Manager, Fashion Stylist, Textile Designer like this lot of opportunities available for the students those who are studying fashion designing. The designers have varied options including designing, research, cloth production, textile designing, etc. They may join fashion houses/manufacturing/export units for a paid job or launch their own label in market. Totally, 84 students from I B.Sc and II B.Sc (FDAM) successfully attended and benefitted by the lecture.

GENERAL COUNSELLING (9 September, 2021)

The department would like to offer General Counseling to the II B.Sc (FDAM) students as a part of the programme. Ms.N.Meenakshi, Assistant Professor of the department outlined about the topic of the day. It was decided by the department to provide same counseling to the students of III B.Sc (FDAM) by Ms.M.P.AnjuMol, Assistant Professor of the Department.

Few excerpts given by the staff members were:

Personal and psychological problems interfere with innumerable aspects of a student's life, causing significant impairment and distress. College students must adapt to environments plagued by rapid change, ambiguity, uncertainty, and depleted support systems. Students must also cope with a myriad of personal and psychological problems that range from basic adjustment and developmental, academic and learning, and career concerns to clinical-level mental

Within this environment, personal and psychological counselling incorporates an expanded interpretation of its role and responsibility through moral science classes and mentor ward system. Encouraging student interactions with academic advisers, faculty, and campus learning centers significantly strengthens a student's chances of being successful and contributes to a student sense of academic and social connection. The department provides a comprehensive view of counselling within higher education reveal a set of role domains that include psychotherapy, career, academic and learning, and educational and psychological outreach. This holistic view of counselling enables services to reach and assist a vast majority of the student community while contributing to an environment of support and encouragement. The department knows that the students arrive on campus with personal and psychological problems centered on dysfunctional family situations; anxiety around social, academic, and career concerns; and mental health issues. 
INTRODUCTION TO TEXTILES INDUSTRIES (September11, 2021)


Many doubts would have arisen in the minds of pupils and their parents as a result of the induction procedure. Ms. M.P.AnjuMol, the department's Assistant Professor, explained why students need to know this information. What is textile research and what is the purpose of it? To the II B.Sc (FDAM) students, every fashion design student should be familiar with Basic Textile Terms such as Fiber and Yarn. She explained why textiles are so important. In order to keep our homes warm and cool, we utilise textiles. Textile items make up the furniture on which we sit and sleep. Roofing materials, wire covers, wall coverings, blinds, air ducts, and window screens are all made from textiles. No. of Participants: Around 37studentsof II B.Sc (FDAM) were part of the session.

BASIC CROCHET (11 September, 2021)

The chain stitch is frequently the first stitch learned by new crocheters. Because chain stitches are the foundation of most crochet creations, they are one of the most crucial basic stitches students will need to learn. Crocheting has the benefit of regulating hormone levels. Repetitive activity causes more serotonin to be released, which promotes mood and tranquilly. Knitting or crocheting could lower cortisol levels in the blood, which is a stress hormone. Learning new abilities and movements can help to establish and strengthen new neuropathways. One of the reasons crochet is being so relaxing is because it would allow us to achieve mindfulness, the state of being in which we are fully immersed in the present moment. This gives the mind a much-needed break from worries about the past and future, allowing the brain and body to both rejuvenate themselves.

It is critical to learn crocheting during this pandemic period in order to relieve stress. It also offers numerous advantages. Ms.V.Aarthi, Assistant Professor of the department, was invited to teach Basic Crocheting to the II B.Sc (FDAM) students. The event took place on September 10th, 2021. The department identified the necessary resources for students to bring on that day and informed them ahead of time. Students were taught several sorts of crocheting and techniques by the demonstrator. The students enthusiastically learned various skills from the skill trainer and provided excellent feedback. The session was attended by around 36 students from the II B.Sc, (FDAM) programme.


SCOPE OF HIGHER EDUCATION (9, September, 2021)

A total of 25 people profited from the session.

The Management of Fashion Portfolio was detailed by Ms.V.Aarthi, Assistant Professor of the department. She stated that the fashion industry is quite competitive, particularly for those who are just starting out. This is why it is critical to have a solid professional portfolio that you can exhibit to potential clients and companies if you want to break into the industry. The advantages of having a distinctive fashion-marketing portfolio are numerous, but the goal is to stand out from the crowd and truly wow potential employers and clients, she added. Ms.Aarthi's Fashion Portfolio Management advice included: Make your portfolio user-friendly, Include business and marketing plans to highlight your professional abilities. Demonstrate your own efforts in online marketing. Keep up with the latest fashion trends. Show off your branding skills all over the place. Your graphic design and photographs should wow. Make extensive revisions to your portfolio. Make adjustments to your portfolio as you go along, and use high-quality printed materials.

She answered the students' questions from the III B.Sc (FDAM) class. The session was beneficial to a total of 25 attendees.



JOB OPPORTUNITIES IN TEXTILE INDUSTRY (10, September, 2021)

Knowledge and experience in sewing can open many doors in clothing, fashion, home décor, and textile industries. Ms.M. Subasri, Assistant Professor delivered speech regarding Job opportunities in textile industry to III B.Sc (FDAM) students and gave partial list of careers in clothing and textile:

Apparel Design and Production-Apparel or Fashion Designer, Assistant Designer, Sample Maker, Sketcher. Apparel Manufacturing- Assembler, Cutter, Trimmer and Inspector, Marker. Pattern Grader, Pattern Maker, Presser, Sewing Machine Operator. Fashion Promotion and Display-Advertising, Advertising Account Executive, Advertising Designer, Display Designer. Display Manager, Graphic Designer, Layout Artist, Mechanical Artist. Media Work- Audio-Visual Specialist, Copywriter, Fashion Illustrator, Fashion Model, Fashion Photographer, Photo Stylist, Press Kit Developer. Retail Sales- Account Manager, Branch Coordinator, Merchandiser, Personnel Director, Public Relations Specialist, Sales Associate, Store Manager. Textile Administration-Accounting and Finance Employee, Business Planner, Data Processing Employee, Personnel Administrator, Public Relations Agent, Purchasing Agent. Textile Design-Textile Colorist, Textile Designer, Textile Stylist. Textile Marketing and Sales -Market Analyst, Textile Advertising and Promotion Agent, Textile Sales Manager, Textile Sales Representative. Textile Production-Industrial Engineer, Machine Operator, Machine Technician, Plant Engineer, Production Supervisor, Quality Control Inspector, Textile Converter. Textile Research-Textile Laboratory Technician, Textile Research Scientist.

Ms.V.Aarthi also offered tips for setting goals to attain success :Set goals for yourself for the accomplishment of the many tasks necessary in starting and managing your business successfully. Be specific. Write down the goals in measurable terms of performance. Break major goals down into sub-goals, showing what you expect to achieve in the next two to three months, the next six months, the next year, and the next five years. Beside each goal and sub-goal place a specific date showing when it is to be achieved.

She instructed the students to plan the steps necessary to achieve their objectives. She also advised against attempting to achieve too many objectives at once. In all, 25 students from III B.Sc (FDAM) attended the lecture and benefited from it.

PLACEMENT COACHING (12 september,2021)

Ms.V.Aarthi, Assistant Professor of the department, began her inaugural lecture for III B.Sc (FDAM) students with this outline. The department held an introduction for all of our department's students in order to provide details about placement in fashion design. Boutiques, Retail Chains, Independent, Self-employed Fashion Designers, Garment and Textile Export Houses, Textile and Fabric Manufacturing Units, Branded Fashion Showrooms, Television and Film Industry, Boutiques, Retail Chains, Independent, Self-employed Fashion Designers, Independent, Self-employed Fashion Designers, Independent, Self-employed Fashion Designers, Independent, Self-employed Fashion Designers, Teaching in a fashion design college with courses such as Retail Manager, Fashion Stylist, and Textile Designer. MACHINE EMBROIDERY (12, September 2021)

Alumni were always invited to participate in the department's activities. Alumni are always willing to lend a hand to the department in order to help the younger graduates learn new skills. Ms.S.Kanaga Parameshwari, from the Alumni (2018-21) batch, expressed interest in participating in the Students Induction Program. She began by showing how to use a machine to embroider. Machine embroidery, she explained, is an embroidery technique in which a sewing machine or embroidery machine is used to produce designs on textiles. Commercially, it is indeed utilized for product branding, corporate advertising, and uniform adornment. It is also used to adorn clothes and apparel in the fashion business. Hobbyists and craftsmen can use their creativity to embellish presents, apparel, and home decor. She cited the examples include designs on quilts, pillows, and wall hangings.

She went over the many forms of machine embroidery in great depth, including free-motion machine embroidery, Cornely hand-guided embroidery, and computerised machine embroidery. A basic zigzag sewing machine is used for free-motion sewing machine embroidery. The designs are created by hand. Link stitch embroidery is used in the majority of commercial embroidery. Patterns in link stitch embroidery can be controlled manually or automatically. Pulse Microsystems patented Link Stitch embroidery, commonly known as chenille embroidery, in 1994. Modern computerised machine embroidery employs a computer-controlled embroidery machine or sewing/embroidery machine that embroiders pre-programmed designs.Multiple heads and threads are possible on these devices. She displayed many styles of embroidery, and the students intently listened and used machines to apply it to their fabric. She answered the students' questions from the III B.Sc (FDAM) class. Twenty three participants benefited from the session.


